There are many different ways to continue education after high school and receive a degree. The type of career your student is interested in will help determine the type of degree and what school she or he chooses to attend.

DID YOU KNOW?

What's the difference between a *college* and a *university*?

Traditionally, *universities* offer graduate programs (Master's and Doctoral degrees), while *colleges* do not. However, there are no official designations for these terms, so colleges can call themselves whatever they want!



COLLEGE MYTHS (AND REALITIES)

MYTH: Students only attend community college because they can't get in to a four-year university.

REALITY: There are many reasons students attend community colleges instead of traditional four-year colleges. Cost is one of the biggest incentives, since community college is usually more affordable. Therefore, many students choose to take core classes at a community college and then transfer to a 4-year university. In addition, many students choose to live at home to save money on housing costs. Class schedules can be more flexible, as well, so students can work more hours. However, community colleges often have fewer services and support and lower graduation rates than 4-year colleges, so the savings might come at a cost.
